

If there's an address in Pune that no one would turn down an invitation to, it's on Boat Club road. Once a bustling hub of boating activities and home to the 150-year-old Royal Connaught Boat Club, today, it is a prestigious residential enclave; a leafy mini neighbourhood with the Mula-Mutha river nearby. A few years ago, Fazal Ali Manekia, founder and chairman of the Dubai-based Merint Group, faced the choice of letting go of a plot of land on this much-coveted road. "We've had several building projects and an important factor in all of them is the location," says Manekia, whose company's prime focus is architectural glass, in partnership with Saint-Gobain. So, he decided to build a luxury real estate project. "It's not about offering a project; it's about delivering a dream," he says.

And thus was born 219 Boat Club, comprising 10 apartments that draw bespoke elements from local and the global design aesthetics. For this, Manekia brought on board British architecture firm Atkins (known, most prominently, for the Burj Al Arab hotel in Dubai) for the master plan. Pune firm Fourth Dimension Architects were looped in for local architecture and engineering design services, while from Mumbai came ADND (who designed the entrance canopy and consulted on furniture) and Studio Hinge (tasked with the entrance lobby, show flat, rooftop clubhouse and facade detailing). A stunning impression is made at the lobby itself, with Studio Hinge's 'Swarm' chandelier—made up of 270 hand-blown bulbs with brass inserts and

programmable fibre optics that change patterns of light, executed by New Delhi-based Klove Studio. Space, often a contentious detail in urban housing, was not a constraint, evident here in the five- and six-bedroom layouts, all *vastu* compliant. The show flat sets the tone for 219 Boat Club's narrative: a sanctuary in every sense of the word—private, quiet, and personal. The apartments sprawl across 8,000 square feet, with 22-foot-high ceilings and rooms that give way to decks with 25-foot-long private infinity pools. The aesthetics of glass is combined with high functionality: 'Climalit' double-glazed glass, for instance, on doors and windows, reduces more than half the external sound and 70 per cent of heat rays. Luxury is further reinforced through Manekia's acute attention to detail—from sunken Jacuzzis to outdoor kitchens for aromatic cooking.

The craftsmanship and bespoke detailing articulates Merint's design vocabulary, adding a rich layer to 219 Boat Club. "The dream of a project, which is truly international yet responds to the site, was so beautiful that we had to materialize this," says Ayeshah Contractor, senior project manager, Atkins. The verdant surrounding further allowed the team to play with materials and colours, resulting in a seamless union of the exterior and the interiors. And that, perhaps, is the key to great design: blurring boundaries.

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
